## **Professor Douglas Bourne**

Douglas Bourne is Professor of Development Education at University College London Institute of Education and is Co-Director of the Development Education Research Centre. He is the author of Theory and Practice of Development Education (2015) and has edited the Bloomsbury Handbook of Global Education and Learning (2020). He is on the Advisory Committee for the UK's main development education programme, Connecting Classrooms Through Global Learning, and is currently working on a new book for Bloomsbury Education for Social Change which is planned for publication in 2021.



### **Judith Klein**

Judith Klein is a research fellow at INN University, Norway, studying Education for Sustainable Development & Global Citizenship. She is currently the director of the Education for Sustainable Development Network (NUBU) in Norway. She previously worked as an advisor to the Norwegian government's Directorate of Education curriculum change unit.



## **Arnfinn Nygaard**

Arnfinn Nygaard works as director of the RORG-network, a network of NGOs in Norway active in GE/DE (funded by Norad), for whom he has worked since 1992. He has been particularly interested in GE/DEAR issues related to the responsible management of the Norwegian petroleum fund, and the fight agains illicit financial flows and tax havens. He was a board member of Global Education Network Europe (GENE) 2009-2019.



### **Aishling McGrath**

Aishling McGrath is the director of Worldwise Global Schools, Ireland's national Global Citizenship Education programme for post-primary schools, where she has worked since it was established in 2013. She holds a BA in geography and economics, is a qualified teacher and holds an MSc in Sustainability Science & Policy.
